

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

OUR PROGRAMS



HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY PREPARATION

Our High School Equivalency classes help students prepare to take the **High School** Equivalency Test (HiSET). These classes cover reading, language, science, math, and social sciences, all of which are subjects included in the HiSET.



ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNING

Students learn to communicate fluently and effectively in English. Using highly individualized instruction, diagnostic assessment data, tutor support, and conversation labs. students gain the fundamental skills required to master the English language.



EXCEL ADULT HIGH SCHOOL

Students have the opportunity to earn an accredited high school diploma and prepare for what comes next. Kansas City Public Library, Mid-Continent Public Library, and Literacy KC have joined together to bring this exciting program to the metro. The program is offered entirely online with 24/7 access.



DIGITAL LITERACY

We believe in the multifaceted nature of literacy, including digital literacy. Our **Digital Literacy** classes are open to the public who are 16+ and range in focus from learning the basics of computers to using Google applications, setting up an email, filling out online forms, and more.



FORKLIFT CERTIFICATION

After this eight week program, students will be certified in five levels of forklift and OSHA trained. The first five weeks of the course are completed online and cover safety. The remaining three weeks will cover how to operate forklifts. The student must pass the safety portion before taking the driver's exam.



CERTIFIED NURSING ASSISTANT CERTIFICATION

During this 18 week program, students will complete the necessary pre-requisites and coursework to become certified. Once a student passes, they will receive three complete certifications: CNA **Knowledge and Skill** certification, Basic Life Support certification, and COVID certification.



SERVSAFE CERTIFICATION

ServSafe is a 10 week program and consists of two levels, basic and advanced.

The basic level, also known as Food Handler, is for students wanting to only pass food in establishments and events (waitress, server, etc.). The advanced level is for students wanting to pursue a Restaurant Manager position.

LET'S READ FAMILY READING PROGRAM

Let's Read is a multi-generational approach to family reading. Built to inspire a tradition of reading in the home, Let's Read offers an action packed hour each week for caregivers and children to laugh, read, and play together.



ANTHOLOGY: VINES OF TRUTH

Vines of Truth is born from a creative writing series Literacy KC hosts each year. Which invites local writers to offer workshops with Literacy KC students to introduce them to creative writing and inspire them to pursue their own writing. The project culminates in a print and digital anthology featuring the poetry, fiction, and nonfiction of Literacy KC's adult learners.

The title, Vines of Truth, was drawn from our prime locations—our School of English on Vine St. and our main office on Troost Ave. Inspired by the efforts of Kansas City activists and community members to rename Troost Ave. as Truth Ave., we felt that Vines of Truth was a fitting title for this celebration of our students. This title also represents how, through telling their stories, our students spread their truths to readers across Kansas City.

> eet Allen Robinson, a 41-yearold from Kansas City, Missouri, whose remarkable journey shines a light on resilience, determination, and the transformative power of education. From a young age, Allen knew he was different and had big aspirations for life. However, as life unfolded, he found himself caught up in certain challenges that tested his path. Despite facing adversity and growing up in a broken home, he always had a deep connection with education.

Due to his circumstances, Allen's early years were marked by struggles and missed opportunities. He wasn't raised with his mother and had to navigate visits during school hours, which inevitably led to gaps in his education. When it came time to graduate, he found himself without enough credits to earn his diploma.

A few years later, Allen became a father, and that life-changing moment shifted his perspective. With no father figure to guide him, he realized the importance of stepping up and becoming the role model his daughter deserved. He was determined not to repeat the cycle and became the father he wished he had in his own life.
